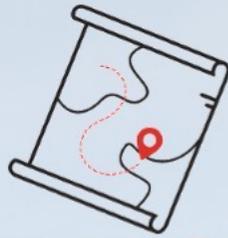

Neil Gaiman's *Coraline* (2002): Gaiman's terrifying tale of a haunted house playfully rewrites elements of Lewis Carroll's *Alice Through the Looking Glass* by way of Freud's essay on the "Uncanny".

Bali Rai, *City of Ghosts* (2009): Rai's novel is a ghost story of sorts, one that takes readers back to Amritsar in 1919 when the British army murdered hundreds of Indian civilians. Harrowing stuff, but a truly important book about Britain's imperial past, which is all too often whitewashed.

The animated film by director Henry Selick, *Coraline* really kickstarts 21<sup>st</sup> Century Children's Gothic.

WALLACE AND GROMIT: CURSE OF THE WERERABBIT (**Oscar Winner – Best Animated Feature!**) This beloved duo bring all the fun and ingenuity to their first full-length feature film—a send-up of the Victorian Gothic horror genre, in which the absent-minded inventor Wallace accidentally swaps brains with a rabbit and wreaks havoc on local vegetable gardens
