

**E-Safety and Social Networking Advice**

**KEEP YOUR CHILD SAFE**

We are aware that many of our pupils use the Internet and have **Facebook** and other social media accounts e.g. Snapchat, Twitter and Instagram, and we feel it is important to give parents/carers some advice about this. Please contact us if you have any concerns or need any more information.

**My child does not have a Facebook Account...**

Facebook's terms and conditions say that you have to be **13** to have an account. If you are **younger** than this (**which means all pupils in the four schools of The Keys Federation Academy Trust**) you can only join by falsifying your date of birth, which is a breach of the terms and conditions.

Anyone under the age of 13 who joins Facebook is presenting themselves as **older than they are**. Some other people join Facebook and pretend to be younger than they are **specifically to gain access to children**. This could put your child at **significant risk**.

**My child has a Facebook account which I know about...**

If you have allowed your child to join Facebook in breach of their terms and conditions, this means you are taking **full responsibility** for their account and everything they do with it.

We advise that:

- you look regularly at your child's account including the **friends** they are making and **what they are writing**
- you add the **Click CEOP** page to your child's profile. This is the Child Exploitation and Online Protection Centre and messages about Internet Safety will appear on their Facebook Wall
- if **you** are on Facebook, be friends with your child – whether they like that or not – so you can monitor activity
- you know their **log on** details and **password** and they have not changed it
- you check they do not have a **second, alternative profile** which you don't know about
- you check the settings are set to maximum privacy for them so that only authorised friends can view information. This will help to prevent grooming or opportunities to radicalise children.
- your computer is in public place in the house.


**I don't know if my child has a Facebook account...**

This is potentially **very risky**.

This means your child may have joined without you knowing at a friend's house or on your computer – **or on their mobile phone** – without you knowing. They can't join or access Facebook at school. It means that you don't know who they are **talking to** and who they are **sharing information with**.

Work through some of the activities with your child so they know about **appropriate behaviour** and how to **stay safe**.



**Good Practice on Social Networking Sites**

All parents are invited to join our staff in setting a good example for our children by:

- Demonstrating courtesy and respect for staff, other parents and pupils when comments are placed on social networking sites.
- Using appropriate language.
- Addressing any issues or concerns regarding school directly with the Principal or a member of staff and not on social media.

**Any family's use of their own computer is essentially a private matter -**

**However**, if **any** use of Facebook or other sites are used to make derogatory comments about the schools, the Academy Trust, another pupil, another pupil's family, any member of staff or director, **we will take very serious and immediate action. This may involve the police and the solicitors and we will also work with Facebook to close down accounts of children under the age of 13.**
